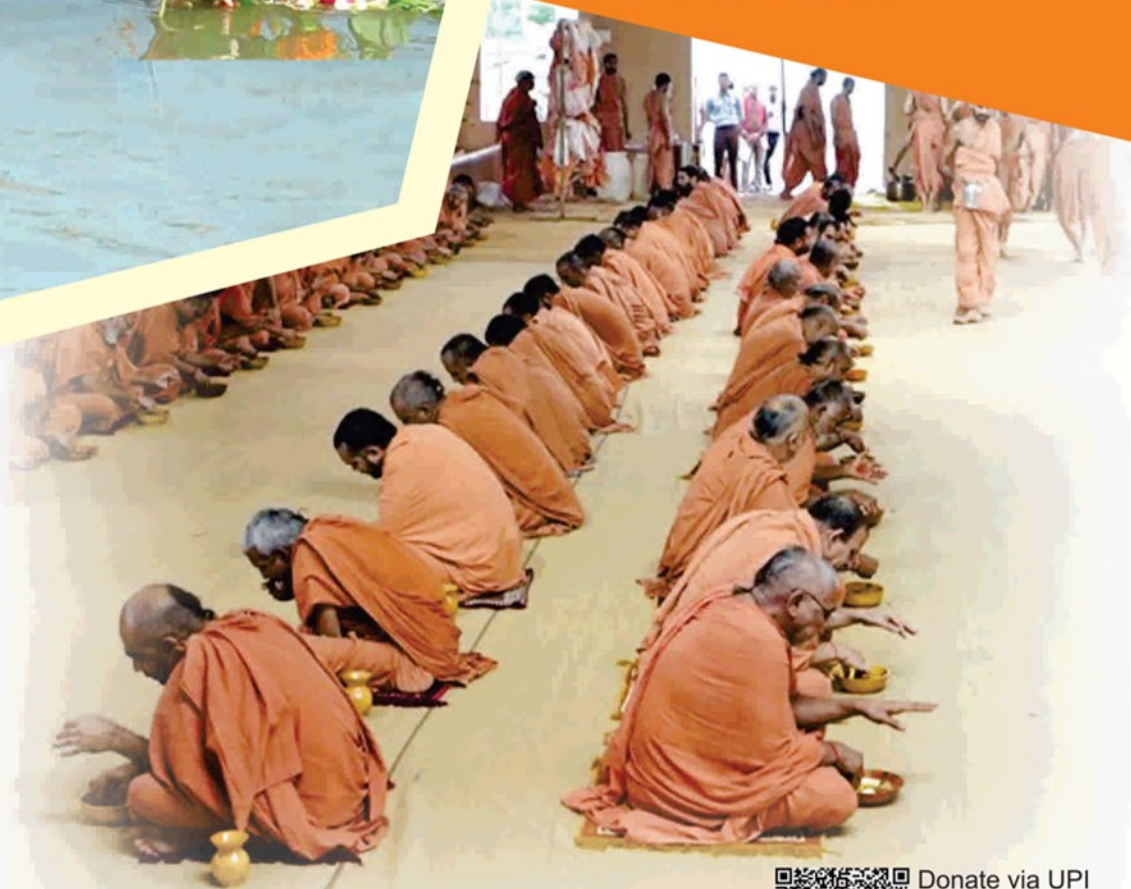

Many people in the world become disheartened in difficult situations or accept them as fate. In reality, happiness and sorrow are part of the journey of life that everyone must go through. One cannot truly experience happiness without sorrow or success without failure. It is the challenges and sorrows that shape a person's character. Just as gold is refined through fire, a person who succumbs to sorrow, failure, deprivation, and difficulties seems to have lost the essence of life itself.

To live life joyfully, challenges are essential. If individuals become anxious about their circumstances, how will they fulfill the purpose for which they were born? We need to learn from those who are extraordinary. In literature, art, sports, and various fields, many differently-abled individuals have set benchmarks of courage and determination that serve as sources of inspiration for us, having overcome challenges and achieved numerous records.

In the last week of March this year, a young man from Saran (Bihar), who has only one leg, hoisted the national flag at a peak thousands of feet high, setting a world record. Uday Kumar, a 91% differently-abled individual, climbed to the summit of 16,500 feet on the Renak Mountain in the Kanchenjunga National Park (Sikkim) with the support of just one leg. He is possibly the first person to achieve this feat.

Devika Malik, a differently-abled para-athlete, has won numerous national and international medals in para-athletics competitions. The challenges in Devika's life began at birth. She was born a premature baby and later suffered from polio. When she learned to walk, she was hit by a motorcycle while playing outside, resulting in paralysis of almost the entire right side of her brain. With physiotherapy, the left side of her body became active up to 50 to 60 percent.

Her mother, Deepa Malik, is also differently-abled. She has not only won national and international medals in para-games but has also served as the President of the Paralympic Committee of India.

Devendra Jhajharia from Jaipur lost one of his arms in an accident, yet he won a gold medal in javelin throw at the Paralympics.

Recently, in the Khelo India NTPC Ranking Archery Meet, the Asian Games gold medalist (differently-abled) archer, Sheetal Devi, won a silver medal among skilled players.

Life without ideals holds no meaning, as this life is a rare opportunity, gained through countless rebirths and good deeds. If we do not engage this life in service and meaningful companionship, we risk losing an invaluable chance for our salvation.

## Shradh is reverence towards ancestors

In Shradh, the sentiment of faith and effort is predominant. That is why it is said, (Shrame aśraddhayādīyateanetyat-tat śraddhām), which means that which is offered with devotion, according to rituals, for the satisfaction of the ancestors, is considered Shradh.



The entire existence of a child is made possible by their parents. Every breath of the child is indebted to their parents. Therefore, it is not only the duty of the child to serve the living parents but also to worship the deceased ancestors to repay the debt to the ancestors. This practice is known as Shradha. From the full moon of Bhadrapada (September 17) to the 16 days of Ashwin Krishna (October 2), it is a time for the ancestors among Sanatan Dharma followers. During this fortnight, the gates of the ancestral realm open, and the ancestors roam the earthly realm, eager to see and bless their descendants.

According to the "Vayu Purana," the offerings and food served to Brahmins and the poor, as well as the water offered during Shradh, satisfy and please the ancestors. These offerings find the ancestors just as a calf finds its mother. Generosity, selflessness, effort, and affection are the essence of Shradha. By performing the prescribed rituals, blessings of prosperity and well-being are sought from the ancestors for the household. For centuries, Shradha has worked to bind generations of families into a single thread.

The Shradha period also makes us aware of our responsibilities towards the protection of living beings, from cows and dogs to the smallest creatures like ants, through the offering of water, highlighting our duties toward rivers, lakes, and vegetation. This helps us keep the environment clean and provides future generations with a healthy atmosphere. If a child's heart is filled with reverence for their ancestors, not only will they receive their blessings, but the grace of the divine family will also remain. Therefore, during the Shradha period, offering pinda-dan (rice balls) and tarpan (water offering) to the ancestors is considered essential for ensuring prosperity in the family.

## Samvatsari, the great festival of forgiveness



Who am I, where have I come from, and what is the purpose of coming into this world? Among the inert and the sentient, which should I hold onto and which should I let go for my benefit? Through these fundamental questions, there is a sincere effort within the Jain community to understand the truth of life and death during the Chaturmas. During this time, the festival of Samvatsari is celebrated with full faith and devotion on the Shukla Panchami of the Bhadra month.

After seven days of renunciation, penance, listening to scriptures, and practicing Dharma, the grand festival of Samvatsari is celebrated on the eighth day. On this day, monks and nuns, as well as laypersons, engage in intense spiritual meditation, renunciation, and penance, seeking forgiveness from one another and fostering a spirit of friendship. The Jain community observes this festival on the 50th day after the commencement of the Chaturmas. The endeavor to attain complete purity on the 50th day, after internal cleansing during the first seven weeks of Chaturmas, is what Samvatsari represents.

The sole purpose of this festival is the development of the soul, in which everyone purifies their soul according to their capacity. The most significant message of Samvatsari is to forgive others and to let go of any mistakes someone may have made against us. Additionally, it encourages seeking forgiveness for any misbehavior we may have exhibited toward others. While forgiving requires the abandonment of anger, seeking forgiveness necessitates the relinquishment of ego. Overall, this festival is a celebration of non-violence, love, cooperation, and goodwill, inspiring individuals to shape their daily lives in a way that enables both individuals and society to attain peace and happiness effortlessly.

It is also noteworthy that from the Ekadashi of Ashadha month to the Dev Uthani Ekadashi (from July 17 to November 21), there is a tradition of living a pure life, engaging in hymns, sermons, and spiritual gatherings by saints, aimed at self-purification.

The Guru Purnima festival was celebrated with great enthusiasm at the institution on July 21. ## The bird chirped

In the Khamaria-Junwani town of Bhilai district, Chhattisgarh, Alijeba Khan was born three and a half years ago. There was joy in this Muslim family with the birth of their daughter, but that happiness quickly faded. The girl was born without the lower part of her left ankle, with a clubfoot on her right leg and no palm on her left hand. This was not a disease that could be treated after birth, yet her parents took her to several hospitals despite their poverty but received no satisfactory assurance from any of them. Some suggested artificial limbs, but the cost was so high that it was nearly impossible for the family to gather that amount. They were left feeling helpless, continuously crying as they imagined the challenges Alijeba would face in the future.

Recently, a relative of theirs saw a post on social media about Narayan SevaSansthan providing free Narayan limbs (arms and legs) and calipers. They immediately informed Alijeba's parents. Without wasting any time, they contacted the organization in May 2024 and brought the child to Udaipur on the scheduled date. Here, specialist doctors examined her and fitted her with special prosthetic legs.

Seeing their daughter stand, sit, and walk brought tears of joy to her parents' eyes. A Narayan artificial hand will also be fitted for her. This child, who used to be sad all the time, now chirps like a little bird.



## Over 2,700 differently-abled individuals have benefited from artificial limbs.

To integrate differently-abled individuals into the mainstream of society and empower them, the organization recently conducted Narayan artificial limb and caliper measurement and fitting camps in four major cities across the country. More than 2,700 differently-abled brothers and sisters benefited from these initiatives.

### Lucknow: 1100 Differently Aabled Individuals

A camp for providing artificial limbs and caliper measurements for the assistance of differently-abled individuals concluded on July 28 in Lucknow. The camp was inaugurated by Mr. Narendra Kashyap, the state's Minister for Empowerment of Differently Aabled and Welfare of the Backward Classes.

At the outset, the president of the institution, Sevak Prashant Bhaiya Ji, welcomed the chief guest and distinguished guests, sharing that 60% of the differently-abled individuals attending the camp had lost their limbs in road accidents. Among these, 20% were children under 16 years of age, and 15% were women. More than 1100 differently-abled individuals participated in the camp, out of which 120 were selected for free surgeries. The institution's orthotist and prosthetist team, under the guidance of Dr. B. L. Shinde and Dr. Akhil Bhaskar, took measurements for creating artificial limbs for approximately 362 individuals and calipers for 375 individuals. The distinguished guests included Mayor Mrs. Sushma Kharkwal, MLA Mr. Yogesh Shukla, Councillor Mr. Saurabh Singh, social worker Mr. Gauri Shankar Gupta, Mr. Chhote Lal, and President of the Gorkha Council Mr. Gaurav Singh, who were all present on stage. The camp was presided over by MLC Mr. Ramchandra Pradhan. The operation of the camp was guided by Director-Trustee Mr. Devendra Choubisa, PRO. Mr. Bhagwan Prasad Gaur, Mr. Aachal Singh Bhati, and Mr. Manish Parihar. The coordination was done by Aishwarya Trivedi.





### Jaipur: 400 Differently Abled Individuals

On August 11, a camp was held in Jaipur where measurements were taken for 250 artificial limbs and 70 calipers for differently-abled individuals. A total of 400 differently-abled individuals registered for the camp. Among them, 60 were selected for corrective surgeries for polio and clubfoot. The camp was inaugurated by social worker Mr. Kanhaiya Lal Ji Shyamsukha, Mr. Dhruv Das Ji Agarwal from the International Vaishya Conference, Mr. N.K. Gupta, Mr. Ram Prakash Ji Vaid, Mr. Manohar Lal Ji Gupta, Mr. Gopal Ji Gupta, Mr. Jitendra Kumar Ji from Normet India, and the institute's president, Sevak Mr. Prashant Bhaiya Ji, who lit the lamp.

While welcoming the guests, Mr. Prashant Bhaiya Ji mentioned that among the differently-abled individuals measured at the camp, 60 percent had lost their limbs in road accidents. He expressed gratitude to Normet India for their support in organizing the camp. He informed that those who had their measurements taken would be provided with artificial limbs at a camp to be held next month in Jaipur. Differently-abled individuals from Dausa, Karauli, Sikar, and Ajmer districts benefited from the camp.

More than 25 organizations, including the Shyam Nagar Development Committee, Jaipur Vipra Foundation, Nia Gem and Jewels, Agarwal Social Service Committee, Jhotwara International Vaishya Conference, Khandelwal Vaishya Development Committee, Sodala Maheshwari Society, Marwari Mahasabha, Human Service Institute, SachchaSukh, Pehchan Institute, Human Service, ParmarthSeva, JeevanArth Foundation, Agarwal Society Committee, Mukherjee Colony Development Committee, Jan Upyogi Bhavan, Shri Khandelwal Vaishya Hitkari Sabha, and Saksham Social Uthan and Development Institute, also provided services. The coordination was done by Mahim Jain.





### Coimbatore: 648 Differently Aabled Individuals

On August 4, an artificial limb fitment camp was organized in Coimbatore (Tamil Nadu) where 648 differently-abled individuals received artificial hands, legs, and calipers. The camp was inaugurated by the chief guest, Mr. Gopal Ji Maheshwari, President of the Maheshwari Sabha, and the special guest, Mr. Gautam Ji Shrimali, President of the Rajasthani Union, along with social workers Mr. Venkatesh Prasad Ji, Mr. Kailash Ji Jain, Mr. Santosh Ji Mundra, Mr. Sitaram Ji, Mr. Kamal Kishore Ji Agarwal, and Mr. Atal Ji Jaiswal, who lit the lamp.

Mr. Prashant Bhaiya Ji welcomed the guests by presenting them with the traditional Mewar turban and dupatta. The camp fitted 538 artificial hands and legs and 110 calipers for the differently-abled individuals. Notably, on April 28, a camp was held in Coimbatore where specialized doctors and technicians took measurements for the artificial limbs and calipers. PRO Bhagwan Prasad Gaur and in-charge Hari Prasad Laddha guided the guests through the camp. The event was coordinated by Aishwarya Trivedi. Local self-help organizations also assisted in the arrangements for the camp.

### Ludhiana: 614 Differently Abled Individuals

On Guru Purnima, July 21, a limb and caliper measurement camp was held in Ayali Kalan Chowk, Ludhiana (Punjab), where 614 differently-abled individuals registered. Measurements were taken for 322 artificial hands and legs for 309 individuals, as well as 145 calipers for 111 individuals. Additionally, 12 wheelchairs were distributed. The chief guest was Mr. Gurpreet Singh Gogi, MLA of Ludhiana-West. The event was presided over by Mr. Kulwinder Singh Sidhu, MLA of Ludhiana-North. Special guests included former MLA Mr. Surendra Singh Dabra, Mr. Jagdish Rai Singal, President of Eastman Global Chamber, Mr. Manohar Singh, President of Marwari Youth Union, and Mr. Anil Gupta, MD of Krishna Enterprises.

After the inauguration of the camp, Mrs. Vandana Ji Agarwal, the institute's director, welcomed the guests and highlighted the institute's free services while providing information about the upcoming five years of service initiatives. Dr. ManasRanjanSahu from the institute and the P&O team completed the selection process. Under the guidance of senior technician Mr. Nathu Singh, the orthotist and prosthetist team conducted limb measurements. Ludhiana Ashram in-charge Mr. Madhusudan, camp coordinator Mr. Rohit Tiwari, and Mahagangaotri in-charge Mr. Rajat Gour, along with Mr. Hariprasada Laddha and Mr. Aachal Singh Bhati, assisted in the camp's operations.



## Chasing Dreams in Delicate Light 63



The train would arrive at Jawai Dam by 5 AM, and Bisalpur was just 3 kilometers away. Horse carriages were usually available at the station, but occasionally they wouldn't arrive so early, forcing him to walk. The fare for the horse carriage was 2 rupees. As he began to arrive in Bisalpur on foot ahead of schedule, he continued this practice even when horse carriages became available, thereby saving 2 rupees.

The departure time from Bisalpur for distributing sattu (roasted gram flour) to the nearby villages was set for 6 AM. Kailash Ji would typically reach before this time; however, if the train was delayed or there were other reasons for a holdup, he would attempt to reach by running. This routine persisted, and every Sunday he would arrive, taking great joy in contributing to the distribution of sattu and other essentials to the poor and needy.

Within a year, he was appointed to another office in Udaipur. Previously, he was in the urban area, but now transferred to the rural area, with the office located in Ambamata. HiranMagri Sector 5 and Ambamata were at opposite ends of the city. Covering such a long distance by bicycle every morning and evening was quite challenging, and he would often tire from cycling. There was no alternative. Meanwhile, he brought his family to Udaipur. After some time, long tempos began operating from Hiran Magri Sector 5 to Ambamata. These tempos became a blessing for Kailash Ji. During that time, hostel students were notorious; they would hop onto the tempos without paying the fare. As a result, many tempo drivers avoided that route. Sometimes tempos were available, sometimes they weren't. If he couldn't catch one, he always had his bicycle. This issue was resolved after a few days, and tempos started arriving regularly.

This was a time when phones were not automated. In larger cities, there were automatic phones with dials, allowing users to call anywhere by simply dialing the desired number. However, such phones did not exist in Udaipur, so one had to inform the operator of the desired number to make a call.

As soon as he picked up the receiver, the operator's voice would come on, asking, "Number, please!" Even if he needed to call somewhere nearby, he had to book a trunk call. Separate numbers were designated for complaints, finding someone's number, etc. The prominent numbers 198, 197, and 180 were commonly used by telephone subscribers daily.

## Trees are Essential for Natural Balance
