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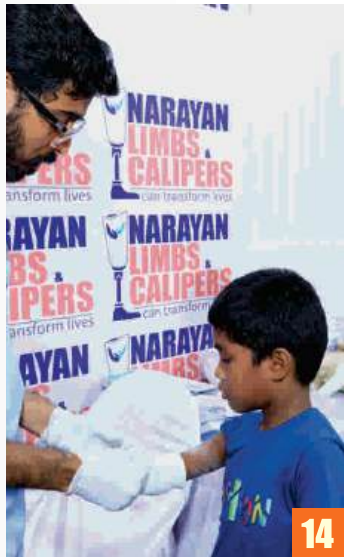
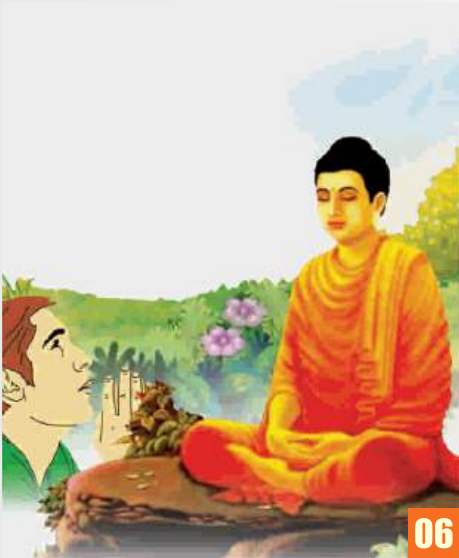

This poor soul is lying here in distress. If he had someone to

take care of him, he would not be in this condition. We can become his family at this moment.” Brothers and sisters, the act of becoming a family for a poor, helpless laborer in such a state, when even his own family members might avoid him due to his illness, shows the depth of compassion that Vidyasagar embodied. He was not just a scholar, but also an ocean of kindness. When his friend recognized this as a blessing, Girish too did not hesitate. Vidyasagar took the laborer on his back, and Girish carried his belongings on his head. They both took the laborer to Kalna, arranged for

his care, called a doctor for treatment, and personally took care of him. After a couple of days, when the laborer regained his strength, they provided him with clothes, food, and money, and sent him on his way.

This story exemplifies how service, compassion, and human dignity come together to uplift lives. It is a reminder that our true purpose is to serve, and in doing so, we enrich not only the lives of others but our own as well.

We are not able to find answers to our questions because of our internal mind. By being silent for some time, our confusions start to go away and we start getting answers to all our questions automatically.

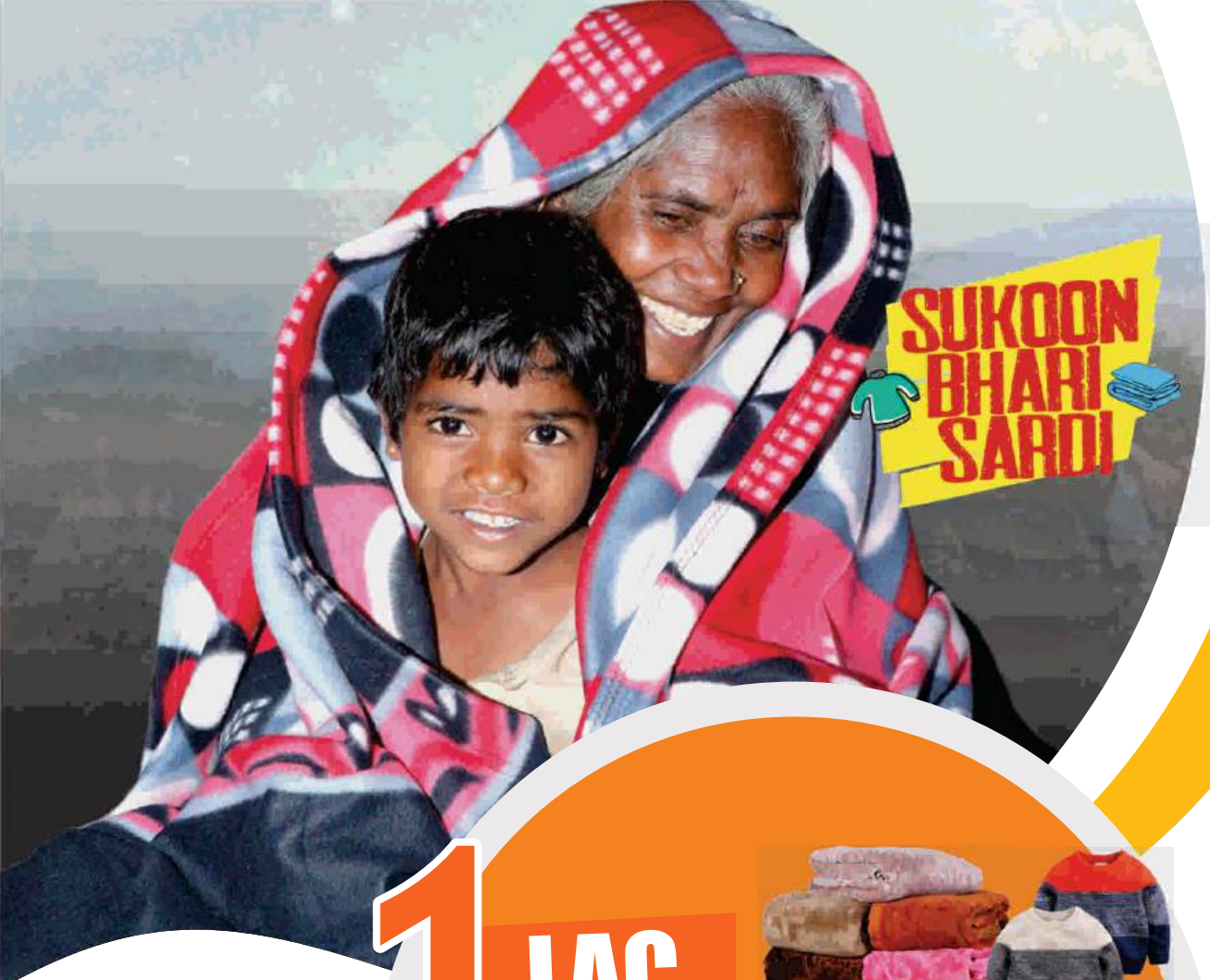

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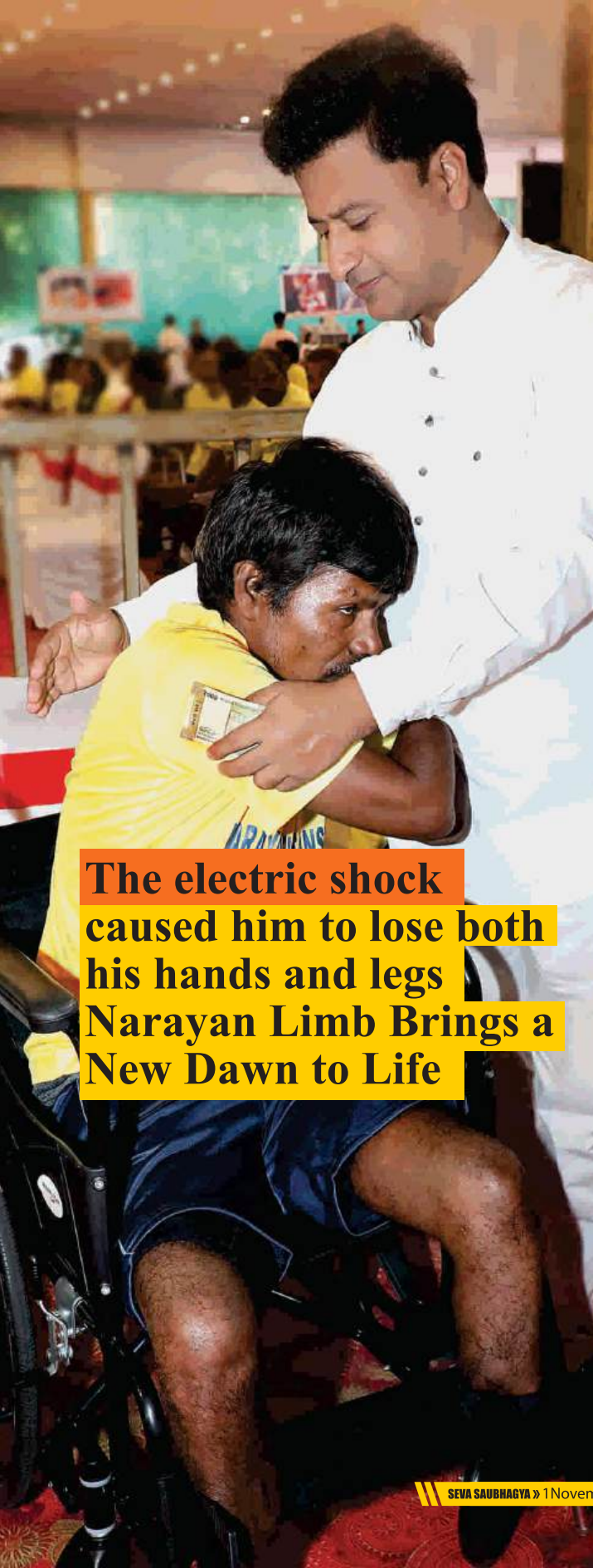

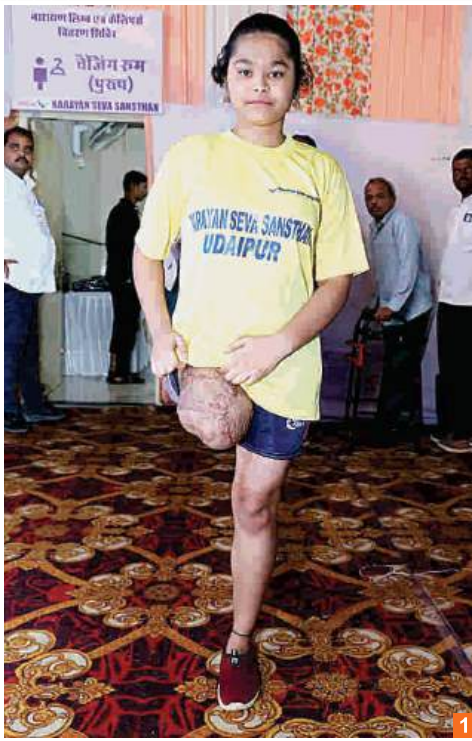

Narayan Limb Brings a New Dawn to Life**

Jagdish Bagdi, a 47-year-old laborer from Indore, Madhya Pradesh, was leading a happy life with his family. However, fate had different plans for him. One day, while he was putting up a flag during a community event, a metal pipe he was handling came into contact with a high-voltage power line. The electric shock severely injured his limbs, resulting in the loss of both his hands and legs.

During his treatment, doctors had no choice but to amputate both his arms and legs. For almost a year, he fell into a deep depression, struggling to come to terms with his new reality. Unable to work or provide for his family, his young son had to take on the responsibility of earning a living. Amidst this struggle, Jagdish came to know about Narayan Seva Sansthan. On June 2, he visited the free prosthetic limb fitting camp organized by the organization. After a three-month wait, on September 15, he received his new prosthetic limbs from Narayan Seva Sansthan. This brought a new lease of life to him. The organization also provided financial support to his family every month, ensuring they had the means to sustain themselves. Now, Jagdish is able to attend family events with his prosthetic limbs, and he has overcome the feelings of inferiority that once plagued him. His life has been transformed, and he is grateful to Narayan Seva Sansthan for giving him the strength to rise above his circumstances.



# Bound by Narayan Seva, not by Suffering.



This is the story of a 17-year-old girl from Uroikanchan village, located 55 kilometers from Pune, Maharashtra. Every day, she would dream new dreams, but then, seeing her amputated leg, she would start crying. Her poor mother, who had always been her support, was also exhausted from fighting battles of survival. Every day seemed like a mountain to climb. On June 9, Narayan Seva Sansthan organized a free artificial limb (arms and legs) measurement camp in Pune. The girl, accompanied by her mother, attended the camp, and her limb measurements were taken. About three and a half months later, on September 29, another camp was held in Pune where the prosthetic limb was fitted according to her measurements. When she stood up and walked unaided for the first time with her new prosthetic limb, both mother and daughter were overwhelmed with emotion.

Tears streamed down her face as she hugged Vandana Agarwal, the Director of the organization, and said, "Sister, when I was born, my father abandoned my mother and us to start a new life. My mother, who was not highly educated, did everything she could to raise me. She worked hard, and we struggled to get by. We hoped that life would get better, but our fate was tied to suffering. Last September, when my mother was returning from work, a truck hit me while we were riding on a scooter to pick her up from the bus stand. I lost consciousness. Strangers took me to the hospital, and my mother rushed there as soon as she heard. My name is Dhanshree, but due to lack of money, I couldn't get proper treatment. After about a month, the doctors had to amputate one of my legs. Thinking about the accident and my amputated leg would make me freeze with fear. It was my mother who gave me the courage to move on, but after 11th grade, I couldn't even go back to school." "Today, thanks to Narayan Seva Sansthan, I am walking on my own after almost a year. I can't express how happy I am. Now, I can go anywhere with my mother, return to school, and play with my friends. My dream is to become a Chartered Accountant. I also wanted to wear jeans, and Vandana ji got me a new pair as a gift. She assured me of help in continuing my studies. Dhanshree said, 'Now, I am no longer tied to my suffering. I am connected to Narayan Seva. I am grateful to the organization for giving me a new life.'"

This is a story of how Narayan Seva Sansthan gave hope, a second chance, and a new life to Dhanshree, helping her regain confidence and rebuild her future.



# Overcome Polio, Embrace Self-Reliance

Rup Shankar Kumar (24), a resident of Gaya district in Bihar, was born with polio, which caused him significant difficulty in walking and moving. Recently, he learned about the free polio corrective surgeries conducted at Narayan Seva Sansthan in Udaipur and decided to visit with his family.

After undergoing an examination, a successful surgery was performed on his feet. Now, Rup Shankar is completely healthy and can move around with ease. After the surgery, he enrolled in the free skill development training center run by the sansthan, where he learned mobile repairing. Today, Rup Shankar is opening his own mobile repair shop in his hometown, becoming self-reliant and contributing to the financial support of his family.



## 4th National Physical Disability T-20 cricket championship

### MP Rawat and Para Olympian Mona Inaugurate the Event

We may have lost a limb in an accident, but the passion and determination to fight life remain intact." With this spirit, the 4th National Physical Disability T-20 Cricket Championship began on October 15 at the Field Club Ground in Udaipur. This eleven-day championship was organized by Narayan Seva Sansthan in collaboration with the Differently Aabled Cricket Council of India (DCCI).

The chief guests for the event were Dr. Mannalal Rawat, Member of Parliament from Udaipur, and Mona Agarwal, the bronze medalist in shooting at the Paris Paralympics 2024. Over 400 players and their coaches from 24 teams across different states of India saluted the occasion with a march past during the flag hoisting ceremony.

The inauguration match took place in the divine presence of Narayan Seva Sansthan founder Pujya Gurudev Shri Kailash Ji 'Manav'. Special guests included Shri Surendra Lohia, President of PCCCI, Jyotsna Chaudhary, State President of DCCI, Rajesh Bhardwaj, Corporate Chairman of DCCI, Elvin Gaikwad, BCCI Manager, Surendra Agarwal, President of DCCI Hyderabad, and Vandana Agarwal, Director of Narayan Seva Sansthan. The event was chaired by Sevak Prashant Bhaiya, President of Narayan Seva Sansthan. Sevak Prashant Bhaiya, in his welcome address, mentioned that the sansthan has been organizing national-level sports events for differently-abled athletes since 2017, contributing towards their empowerment. He also informed that 67 matches will be played across five grounds in Udaipur city.

DCCI Secretary Ravikant Chouhan, while welcoming everyone on behalf of DCCI, shared that the players participating in the championship were selected based on their performance in various tournaments held over the past year. All players are over 18 years of age, and most of them have either one arm or one leg or suffer from congenital physical disabilities. Some of the players also have underdeveloped body parts.



## Grand Kanya Pujan at Seva Mahatirth

On 11th October, Narayan Seva Sansthan organized a grand Kanya Pujan ceremony on the occasion of Durga Ashtami during the Sharadiya Navratri. The ritual was conducted under the guidance of the sansthan respected founder, Shri Kailash Ji 'Manav', and co-founder, Smt. Kamla Devi Ji Agarwal. The chief guests for the ceremony were social worker Shri Bharat Bhai and Smt. Sharda Ben Solanki from America, along with Shri Ramrucha Ji and Shri Randeep Rampal Ji, who had come from Mauritius. Together, they performed the Maha Aarti of the goddess in the form of young girls, lighting 501 lamps. During the event, the girls of Narayan Children Academy also performed Garba Raas.





Smt. Meena Ji Sankhla from Jodhpur, Shri Ashok Ji Verma, Smt. Indra Ji, Shri Virendra Ji, Smt. Raksha Gupta from Delhi, and Shri Sanjeev Ji and Smt. Saraswati Devi Ji from Bokaro were present at the event.

At the beginning, the sansthan's president, Sevak Prashant Bhaiya, welcomed the guests and mentioned that during this Navratri, corrective surgeries for disabilities had been successfully carried out on the revered young girls. These girls, who had lost their limbs in road accidents or other mishaps, were provided with prosthetic limbs. He emphasized that the concept of creation would not be possible without mothers.

The director of the sansthan, Smt. Vandana Ji Agarwal, draped the girls in red chunaris and offered a prasad of 56 different types of delicacies including halwa, puri, and black chickpeas. The revered girls, who had come from different states of the country for free surgeries, were also presented with gifts. A special attraction of the event was the portrayal of the goddess with weapons and various items in her hands, such as a computer, smartphone, pen, national flag, stethoscope, rocket, etc., symbolizing the message of "Beti Bachao-Beti Padhao."

Among the girls, aged five to eleven, Zoya Chakraborty from Kolkata, Radhika from New Delhi, Ruchi from Jharkhand, Jahnvi from Dungarpur, and Bhavna from Nagaur shared their heartfelt stories of losing their limbs, moving everyone present and bringing tears to their eyes. The event was conducted by Mahim Jain.



## Wheelchair, crutches, and sticks—returning home with newfound strength

In September, free artificial limb measurement and fitting camps were organized in Indore, Siliguri, and Pune under the sansthan's aegis. Approximately 1,300 differently-abled individuals benefited from these camps. Those who arrived using wheelchairs, crutches, or tricycles left with artificial limbs, their faces radiating a lasting smile as they returned home.



**Siliguri-** On September 22, a free operation screening and selection camp, along with Narayan Limb and Caliper measurement camp, was organized at Uttarbanga Marwari Bhawan in Siliguri. The inauguration was graced by Chief Guest Mrs. Shering Y. Bhutia, Commissioner of Siliguri Municipal Corporation, and Sub-Division Officer Mr. Avadh Singhal.

Prominent guests included Mr. Ramesh Kumar Agarwal, Mr. Prithviraj Agarwal, Mr. Gangadhar Nakipuria, Mr. Mukesh Singhal, Mr. Prakash Padiwal, Mr. Jagmohan Singh, Mrs. Meena Agarwal, Mr. Ramavatar Barelia, and Mr. Dilip Gupta.

Mrs. Bhutia expressed her admiration for the services provided by the sansthan, praising the entire team for their commendable work in supporting differently-abled individuals. She highlighted that the efforts of Narayan Seva Sansthan in empowering differently-abled individuals and women contribute significantly to realizing the vision of a developed and healthy society in India. She assured all possible support to the institute for the welfare of differently-abled individuals in Siliguri.

Mr. Avadh Singhal stated that the administration would act as a bridge to support Narayan Seva Sansthan in empowering differently-abled individuals. At the beginning of the event, Mrs. Vandana Agarwal, Director of the sansthan, warmly welcomed the Chief Guests and other dignitaries on the



dais following the traditional Mewari customs. She provided detailed information about the sansthan's free service initiatives. Differently-abled individuals from Bihar, Nepal, Guwahati, Sikkim, Kolkata, Birbhum, and Bankura, including Darjeeling district, attended the camp. Over 15 local organizations, including Uttarbanga Marwari Seva Trust, Shriram Seva Parivar, Agarwal Mandal, Jain Shwetambar Terapanth Sabha, Uttar Bengal Maheshwari Seva Trust, and the All India Transport Association (Siliguri branch), actively contributed their services to the camp. Camp in-charge Mr. Achal Singh Bhati, in his report, shared that more than 300 differently-abled individuals were examined by sansthan's doctors and P&O team. Measurements for Narayan Limbs (arms and legs) were taken for 110 individuals, and calipers for 74 individuals. Additionally, around 30 individuals were shortlisted for surgical procedures. A follow-up camp will be organized in Siliguri in 2 to 3 months to provide the fabricated limbs and calipers to the beneficiaries. Mr. Bhagwan Prasad Gaur, the institute's Public Relations Head, expressed gratitude, and the event was coordinated by Mahim Jain.





**Indore:** On September 15, Narayan Seva Sansthan organized a Narayan Limb and Caliper Fitting Camp at Dastur Garden, located in Footi Kothi, Indore. Over 642 differently-abled individuals benefitted from the camp, receiving upper and lower artificial limbs and calipers. Among the beneficiaries, 30% were under 18 years of age, and 25% of the 45 adults were women.

The camp was inaugurated by Member of Parliament Shri Shankar Lalwani, who commended Narayan Seva Sansthan's services for significantly improving the lives of the differently-abled. He praised the efforts of the institute's founder, Shri Kailash Ji 'Manav,' and its president, Sevak Prashant Bhaiya Ji.

The event was presided over by social worker Shri Paras Ji Kataria, with distinguished guests including Dr. Ramchandra Ji Maheshwari, Dr. Manorama Ji, Anil Ji Bhandari, and Kishore Ji. Shri G. Kasturi, Shri Deepak Ji Kothari, Shri



Ramesh Ji Srivastava, Shri Amit Ji Joshi, Shri Anil Ji Ranka, and Shri Kailash Ji Manav were also present on the stage. The guests distributed wheelchairs to 20 needy individuals, walkers to 50, and crutches to 32, all provided by Narayan Seva Sansthan.

In the beginning, the president of the Sansthan, Sevak Shri Prashant Bhaiya Ji, welcomed the guests and participants, sharing the sansthan's services so far and presenting the vision for the next five years.

After receiving artificial limbs at the camp, the differently-abled individuals demonstrated their skills by playing football and badminton. Those who had come using crutches, wheelchairs, tricycles, or dragging their feet, walked away on their own, wearing the artificial limbs or calipers.





**Pune:** On 29th September, a Narayan Limb and Caliper Fitting Camp was organized at Tirupati Mangal Garden in Pune (Maharashtra), where 257 differently-abled individuals received artificial limbs (arms and legs), and 88 received calipers. Most of these individuals had lost their limbs in accidents. The measurement work for these limbs had been completed earlier in Pune on 9th June.

The camp was inaugurated by Rajya Sabha member Dr. Megha Kulkarni, and the camp was presided over by MLA Sunil Tingre. He described the sansthan's service projects as a great relief for the suffering humanity and expressed his commitment to organizing similar camps in his region to serve differently-abled individuals through Narayan Seva Sansthan.

The event also had distinguished guests, including former minister Shri Raghunath Kuchik, Corporator Shri Hulgesh Chalwadi, Shri Jagdish Agarwal, Shri Moolkishan Gupta, Shri Rajveer Agarwal, Shri Rahul Bohra, CAMohit Agarwal, Smt. Ritu Tayal, Shri Suhas Tingre, Shri H.S. Portinis, and senior BJP leader Ninad Patwardhan.

The director of the sansthan, Smt. The guard, laughing, said, "Yes, yes, you can certainly go inside. The reading is going on, and anyone can join." Kailash ji was delighted to hear this. He left his bicycle and walked inside. There, he saw Kailash ji Manav, whom he knew. Kailash ji Manav was the owner of the famous K & R Sewing establishment in Udaipur and was a highly religious and socially active person.
